#### **National Economy**





- (Seasonally Adjusted) JSA Claimants down 12,600 in April to 764,000 (the 30th consecutive monthly reduction)
- There are now 31.1 million people across the UK in employment (a rate of 73.5% and highest since records began)





• Comparing December to March with a year earlier, average weekly earnings, excluding bonuses, rose by 2.2%. The rate was up from 1.8% in the three months to February. The rate rose 1.9% if bonuses are included




 The figures mean that regular pay is now growing at its fastest rate for nearly four years.





# National Economy (continued)

- UK Consumer Prices Index (CPI) inflation turned negative in April for the first time on record, falling to -0.1%, official figures show.
- It is the first time CPI has turned negative since 1960, based on comparable historic estimates
- The biggest contribution to the fall came from a drop in air and sea fares.






## Local Economy Job Seekers' Allowance (JSA)


- Currently 7669 people claiming JSA in the York, North Yorkshire and East Riding LEP. Lowest since records began
- Monthly fall of 765 claimants, which is 1.1% of working age population and the number of claimants fell in every district
- Harrogate now has lowest claimant rate in the country with only 379 claimants (0.4%)
- Universal Credit
  - Harrogate has 500 residents who claim Universal Credit (UC). It is currently impossible to work out how many UC claimants would have claimed JSA if UC didn't exist. Many UC claimants are in employment.
  - York has 130 UC claimants as of April 2015, Hambleton has 50 and Craven and Ryedale have 20 each.



## A map showing the JSA claimant rate during April 2015 across the districts of England










## Job Seekers Allowance claimants in the districts of York, North Yorkshire and East Riding as of April 2015 (ONS)





#### Different Types of Benefit Claimants as percentage of working age population by District in November 2014




ESA and Incapacity Benefit is the statistical group which makes up the highest proportion of claimants.

#### Out of Work Benefits claimant rate in the LEP and England




- The graph on the left shows how the pattern of "out of work benefit" claimants in the LEP has followed national trends
- The graph on the right shows how JSA claimant rate is the most significant component of change although in the most recent quarter a rise in ESA and IB offset the fall in JSA to keep the out of work benefit rate at 6.6%.

#### Out of Work Benefits\* rate in the LEP and England (DWP)

- Both nationally and locally the numbers of people claiming benefits for being "carers" has increased consistently since records began in 1999.
- If trends continue there will soon be more people in the LEP claiming benefits for being a carer than for seeking employment.
